ONS Coronavirus (COVID-19) Infection Survey - antibody data - 3 February 2021

ONS have changed the way antibody estimates are reported and are now presenting weighted estimates for 28-day periods of antibody positivity, rather than monthly estimates. This approach will allow for more frequent updates and antibody data will now be published fortnightly. Please note that these 28 day estimates cannot be directly compared with previously published antibody estimates

Covid-19 Shielding Programme - Public Health Scotland Publication

The 'COVID-19 Shielding Programme (Scotland) rapid evaluation' report has been published from Public Health Scotland. The evaluation report can be accessed

A few key findings:

- Shielding correctly targeted individuals at higher risk but others, also at higher risk, were not included;
- Shielding guidance changed people's behaviour but some would also have 'shielded' without the guidance;
- Shielding support addressed real need but the support could not address all needs;
- There is not enough evidence to answer the question whether shielding resulted in fewer infections;
- Future approaches need to consider: opportunities for informed choice, the multi-faceted nature of risk and the risk of hospital-onset infections.

FPH published a statement on 01 February 2021 advocating that '*It is right that those at greatest risk are prioritised in receiving the vaccine. But in order to do this, barriers to access for disadvantaged and minority ethnic communities, such as the requirement to register with a GP, must be removed.*'

Cllr Kelly Parry COSLA Community Wellbeing Spokesperson and Aileen Campbell, Cabinet Secretary for Communities and Local Government has since issued a joint <u>letter</u> to local authorities acknowledging the progress being made locally and renewing their joint commitment to mainstreaming participatory budgeting.

Alcohol and drug partnerships: additional Scottish Government funding 2020-2021

Additional funding has been made available to Alcohol and Drug Partnerships for this financial year (2020-21) to support work to reduce drug deaths in Scotland.



Details are below, as well as a letter from the Scottish Government to Integration Authorities setting out a total of £3 million allocation to increase provision of residential drug rehabilitation placements and improve access to treatment and harm reduction activities. Funding has been based on the number of drug deaths in each area.

Adaptation Scotland – Publication

Scottish Health Inequalities Impact Assessment Network (SHIIAN)

A systematic review has been undertaken on the associations between population density or neighbourhood design and transmission of Covid-19 or other respiratory viruses.

Dr. Margaret Douglas (Programme Co-Director, Masters of Public Health (on campus), Usher Institute, University of Edinburgh and Honorary Consultant in Public Health, Public Health Scotland) concludes the review in brief as follows:

'This review found no convincing evidence of a link between population density and transmission of Covid-19 and other respiratory infections. Although the possibility of an association cannot be ruled out, the current evidence does not suggest a need to change the current Scottish Government policy of support for the '20-minute neighbourhood' concept. Similarly, no clear conclusion can be drawn about any association between other characteristics of neighbourhood design and transmission of respiratory infection, including Covid-19. Further multi-disciplinary research using appropriate, sophisticated designs, is needed to allow a better understanding of links between neighbourhood characteristics and transmission of respiratory infections.'

It also shows that those of us already struggling to keep our heads above water have often been hit the hardest.'
